# Can You Take up Your Cross AND Follow Your Heart? By Sue Saur

In a word, no.

Mark 8:34 (King James Version) says this, "And when he called the people unto him with his disciples also, he said unto them, whosoever will come after me, must deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow me."

The NLT says it this way: "Then, calling the crowd to join his disciples, he (Jesus) said, 'If any of you wants to be my follower, you must give up your own way, take up your cross, and follow me."

Jesus uses the word "follow" twice in his sentence. Here's what he means—If you want to be my disciple, here's how you follow me-- deny yourself, and take up your cross.

So, let's start with the "deny yourself" part. At first glance we could see this command as something like giving up chocolate for Lent, but He's not talking about denying yourself something--what he means is —deny your "self", or as the NLT puts it, "give up your own way."

Your "self", my "self"—our "selves" are —in a nutshell, "self" serving by our very nature. Jesus says, if you want to be called a Christian, you <u>must</u> say no to that self-serving "self" of yours.

That "self" often hides behind a big sign with a sweet, seemingly innocuous heart drawn on it. The caption reads, "Follow Your Heart". Looks innocent enough, but that "self" is just back there snickering. "Self" needs you to buy into the message that you are "#1", that you deserve—well, pretty much everything—and your first priority is to get it.

It's a nervous laugh though, because as you get better at denying your "self", as you mature in your faith, you increasingly become "self" less. As you fall deeper in love with Jesus, instead of desiring to follow your heart, you desire to follow His.

Then there's that "take up your cross" part. At this point, Jesus hadn't been to the cross, but every Jew knew what "the cross" meant. Today we wear a cross as jewelry or use it as décor for our home-to identify us in a safe --and socially acceptable manner as a Christian. But in Jesus' day, the cross was the ultimate means of torture and death, employed by the Romans to keep the people in line.

It was very effective.

### Can You Take up Your Cross AND Follow Your Heart? cont.

When a person was convicted and sentenced to die, they were first humiliated—publicly stripped and beaten, and then forced to carry their cross to the execution site outside the city.

There they hung on the cross until they suffocated. If that process took too long for the impatient Roman guard, he would break their legs with an iron club, making it impossible for them to push up with their feet in order to allow their chest to expand and take a breath. Death would come quickly.

But why would Jesus tell the crowd that they should take up their cross? Jesus wasn't a fan of the "bait and switch." He wanted to lay everything out on the line. No, not everyone would be martyred for their faith in Jesus, but it was a definite possibility. (For the record, all but one of the disciples ended up being martyred.) He said, if they hated me, why wouldn't they hate you? They reject me, they mock me, and you can expect the same if you call yourself my follower, my disciple.

In 2022, in America, we don't fear being martyred, though there are places in the world where it still happens frequently. In many places, Christians are arrested and jailed simply because of their faith, but here in America, we face social prejudice more than legal or lethal repercussions. We can be mocked. We risk losing our status. We can be "cancelled."

Jesus tells his disciples, and us, up front, the cost of being a Christian.

So, here's the takeaway:

To deny our "selves", moment by moment, day after day, we will need to be <u>intentional</u>. If our goal is to love—and-- serve—and <u>know</u> Jesus, we make those activities our priority. <u>Priorities</u> get time in our day—otherwise, we (our "selves") might decide we are just too busy.

Once we find our place to serve, we go with the understanding that we may not be appreciated. We will probably not get a certificate of merit. It might not be pleasant.

And that's ok. Actually, its better.

When we can serve and desire—truly desire—for the glory to go to God instead of our "selves"—we find true joy. Bigger than we ever imagined.

The irony.

The moment we can stop making it all about our "self" is the moment we are satisfied.

Jesus, may we find your glory so satisfying, so complete, that we long to serve you daily from a place of selflessness. In Your Holy Name. Amen
