

"Seeing with New Eyes"

I wonder if you remember the "Magic Eye" wall art that became popular back in the mid 1980s-90s (google tells me it is technically referred to as "autostereograms")?

Looking like a snowstorm of fuzz on a television screen, these images were often framed and sold in the mall. It was common to see a small huddle of folks standing in front of one of these pictures for 5 or 10 minutes, until one-by-one they said, 'Oh wow, I can see it!' Those little exclamations drew more people into the circle.



As you may remember, if you stared at the blur long enough and in just the right way, the picture transformed before your eyes. Somehow the flat blur gave way to depth and shapes appeared. It seemed as though you could reach your hand into the fuzz as the 2D became 3D.

I have been thinking about those Magic Eye or Autostereogram images recently, because there seems to be a widespread feeling at the present moment that surveying our cultural landscape leaves one feeling like they are looking at a fuzzy snowstorm. Of course, that has always been the case to a certain degree, but what I take to be unique and somewhat new in American life is the quiet insistence being pushed by almost all of our cultural leaders that the 2D perspective is all there is to see. It's all fuzz and blur!

What is the 2D perspective? From what I can tell, "time" and "stuff" make up the essential elements of most public conversations today. In fact, this '2D ONLY' mindset runs so deeply that it has become the unstated and unchallenged tenet of faith that undergirds our social institutions. It goes something like this: If people are given enough time and money, our disagreements and social problems will disappear. And so, discussions begin with a 2D analysis and then proceed to 2D solutions. But what we are finding is that something in the human spirit (call it what you will - 'morality', 'spirituality', 'religion', etc.) yearns for our common life together to be more than a blurry fuzz of infighting over the limited resources of time and money.

Of course, the Bible has much to say about the 2D issues of time management and financial stewardship (see the Book of Proverbs, for example). And numerous stories from Scripture emphasize that time and resources need careful attention (see Acts 6, for example). But, if our Lord taught us anything in his earthly ministry, it was surely that real, full, and abundant life requires much more than time and money (see Matthew 6:25b, "Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?")! Let's not over-spiritualize here; after all, Christians enjoy holidays and tax breaks as much as anyone else! But our life with Jesus goes much deeper than these 2D elements.

A true and robust Christian community is one that invites newcomers and long-time members to an ever deepening vision. Visiting and especially being involved in a vibrant church will feel like putting on a pair of glasses - the teachings, outreach, community gatherings and compassionate care of the church will bring into focus spiritual dynamics that are hiding in plain sight among 2D realities. Through the ministries of the church, we remember together the blessings that we so easily forget; we hear a friend whom we thought we knew tell a faith-building story that changed the course of their lives; we find our hearts moved by various needs in our community and world that will never hit the headlines; and we encounter God's gracious call to live as a forgiven people full of hope.

The pages of this Newsletter invite us all to see with a fuller 3D vision and to keep in focus those things that Jesus Christ purchased for us in his incarnation, death and resurrection. In the many wonderful opportunities on offer at First Protestant Church for gathering and outreach, God's Holy Spirit trains us to keep an eye on what truly matters and endures.

For example, you will be reminded about the upcoming opportunity to learn what God is doing around the world, as missionaries visit FPC for our GIC event (Feb 16-19th). You will read Sue Saur's encouraging words to keep worship at the center of our service, and you will be inspired by Mrs. Thora Williams, who recently celebrated with her Eden Home friends 100 years of life and God's goodness. "The Magic of Storytelling"

I don't know about you, but storytelling has always had a profound effect on me. As a kid (and if I'm being totally honest as an adult sometimes too) I always wanted to be swept up into some grand story. I wanted to fall through a wardrobe and find myself in a magical land. I wanted a wizard to knock on my door and tell me of a dragon guarding a treasure under a mountain in a far away land. I wanted an owl to bring me a letter inviting me to come to a magical school.

I think along with art and music, storytelling is part of what makes humanity unique. I think God has designed us to learn through storytelling for a reason because God himself teaches us through stories, be that true stories such as the historical books of scripture or the parables that Jesus would tell. Stories in whatever form can be simple escapist entertainment, but they can also be so much more if we allow them to be. Stories have an ability to teach, to help us think about the world beyond our own experiences, and to inspire through provoking conversations about life, our world, spirituality, and God.

One of my daughter, Bailey's, favorite movies is Disney's recent film, Encanto. It is a film about a Columbian family, the Madrigals, where all the children and grandchildren of the matriarch, Abuela, have magical gifts... well that is except the protagonist, Maribel, who laments her lack of magic and feeling of not being special. Beyond the music or even the amazing Columbian setting what makes Encanto great to me is its deeply Biblical message. Despite being a "fantastical and magical" family each with their own special gift who live together in a magical "casita" there are cracks beneath the surface... both literally and figuratively.

Every time I watch this movie I'm reminded of Paul writing to the Corinthians who were a special family of their own, the family of God. Paul tells them of the different gifts they have, although instead of those gifts being super hearing, controlling the weather, and talking to animals, they are things like faith, wisdom, and teaching. In speaking of their gifts, however, Paul cautions them that everyone in the body is needed and that there must be unity. He writes, "The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (1 Corinthians 12:21-26 ESV).

That message, that the parts of the body which may seem weaker are in fact indispensable is the exact lesson we learn through Maribel when watching Encanto. And if we think more deeply about all of the stories we consume I promise you will find these Biblical truths hiding everywhere in plain sight. Stories are so much more than just distractions. The good ones always tap into some truth, even if unintentionally. That is why they resonate in our hearts.

I said at the beginning that I longed to be brought into a grand story and while I don't think I will be living in a magical house in Columbia anytime soon, the great news is that all of us actually are being invited into the grandest story of all. The greatest story being told is the story of God redeeming humanity to himself. The more I read scripture the more amazed I am by just how compelling that story is. For Christmas I got Bailey a Story Bible by Kevin DeYoung that I cannot recommend enough. It so succinctly retells Bible stories in an engaging and age appropriate way while also bringing to the surface so much theological depth and beauty. It has been the highlight of each day to read one story a night with her. I think we are both learning things as we go and the conversations it has inspired about who God is have been priceless.

I want to invite you to read more stories with your kids and after reading a story or watching a movie to think about what truths were told. Ask questions like what were the values displayed? What were the lessons being taught? And even more importantly I want to encourage you to make telling and retelling the stories of scripture a regular part of your day or week with your kids. It is hard to overstate the spiritual impact reading and discussing these stories will have on the spiritual development of your child. You will be amazed by the conversations this will inspire and how often even talking about a Disney movie can naturally turn toward the spiritual which provides amazing teaching opportunities.


